

Morning - 9.30 - 11.45am


Afternoon- 1.00 -2.45pm

In between all of these we have squeezed in celebrating Red Nose Day, Mother's Day and Rock You Socks Off for Down Syndrome Day.


We are now gearing up for Easter celebrations for the last week of this half term.

As always, we continue to explore our environment in a multi-sensory manner and develop our personal and social skills!


















Wetherlam

This has been alongside all their other learning too, it has been a lovely, busy half term.


















Grassmoor

The children have learned about Mary Anning, a famous palaeontologist, and written questions to interview her with.

We even had the opportunity to pretend to be palaeontologists by digging for fossils!






As the weather has improved, Blencathra have proven themselves as budding gardeners during a trip to Beezon fields to plant bulbs in the new sensory garden that is being developed.



Fairfield




Fairfield enjoyed visiting the aquarium as part of our 'Commotion in the Ocean' theme. We have been studying the course of the River Kent. We're hoping to go up to its source in the Kentmere valley once the weather picks up-probably after Easter now!

Art this term has seen us creating sculptures to reflect plant life under the sea - some amazing creations! We've also written poems about sea creatures and created a comic based on an underwater journey using the silent comic The Wanderer' by Peter Van De Ende as inspiration.

Helvellyn




This half term we have been looking at skills and knowledge of our bodies. In science we looked at hand washing and used a UV light to detect how clean our hands were. We cleaned our feet after making footprints. We drew around each other to name body parts.

Pillar



Pillar class this half term have begun to focus on their upcoming residential to Glasgow in June. Students have researched cultural assets in Glasgow and compared Glasgow to Kendal.

In addition to studying what Glasgow has to offer students have been reading poems in Overheard in a Towerblock by <u>Joseph Coelho</u>. Joseph is the 12th and current Children's Laureate. Students have used

written methods like simile, metaphor and alliteration in their own poems about school life and life around them.

More recently, mock exams were sat in preparation for May exams. Year 11s will sit 'live' Functional Skills Entry Level Certificate exams in the classroom in the middle weeks of May. The exams set by Pearson/ Edexcel being sat are English, maths and ICT. Y10 students will sit additional mocks at the same time as the Y11s to practise.

We continue to research the residential after the Easter break and students will begin to plan the logistics of train travel, venue locations, opening times, costs and plan an evening meal as well as where to eat out."



Pillar class were successful in an application to Orchards for Schools. We were given 2 apple trees and 60 hedgerow whips.

We worked with Chris Eastman from QKS we dodged the showers and planted in the Community Garden over the last two weeks.

We attended a Careers Fair in Kendal which was a great opportunity to speak with local employers and colleges
















Skiddaw




This term in Skiddaw we have been learning about unit and non-unit fractions, and here we are, two thirds of the way through the school year! Anyone in Skiddaw will be able to tell you that two thirds is a non-unit fraction: we've been noticing them everywhere! For instance... sixth ninths of the class have been taking part in Animal Studies at Lancaster & Morecambe College over the past 5 weeks. It's been a fantastic experience, as these comments testify:

'I've enjoyed handling the animals in Animal Care and finding out more about where they come from' (Oliwia).


'The environment at college is nice and welcoming and the staff are really friendly. I enjoyed holding the rat' (Rach).

This term we have also been working on our problem-solving skills, reading instructions and working out how to complete the Koboca physical challenges. In addition, we've looked at weather forecasts to problem-solve how to travel to and from the swimming pool: it seems to have been quite a wet and windy half term!

One of the highlights of the term was World Book Day, where we focused on our rights as a reader, shared our thoughts on this term's class reader, 'Runaway Robot' (see the photo for our Runaway Robot poster), and enjoyed an Alice in Wonderland tea party. We've also been working on PowerPoint presentations of chosen topics, incorporating key features of non-chronological reports. The presentation topics range from Poland to Pizza, and we have been impressed by the students' IT skills and research findings: watch this space for live presentations after Easter! All of this hard work will contribute to the students' BTEC Digital Skills portfolio, which we're on track to complete this year. Well done everyone - we look forward to the final one third of the year (a warm and sunny unit fraction)!
